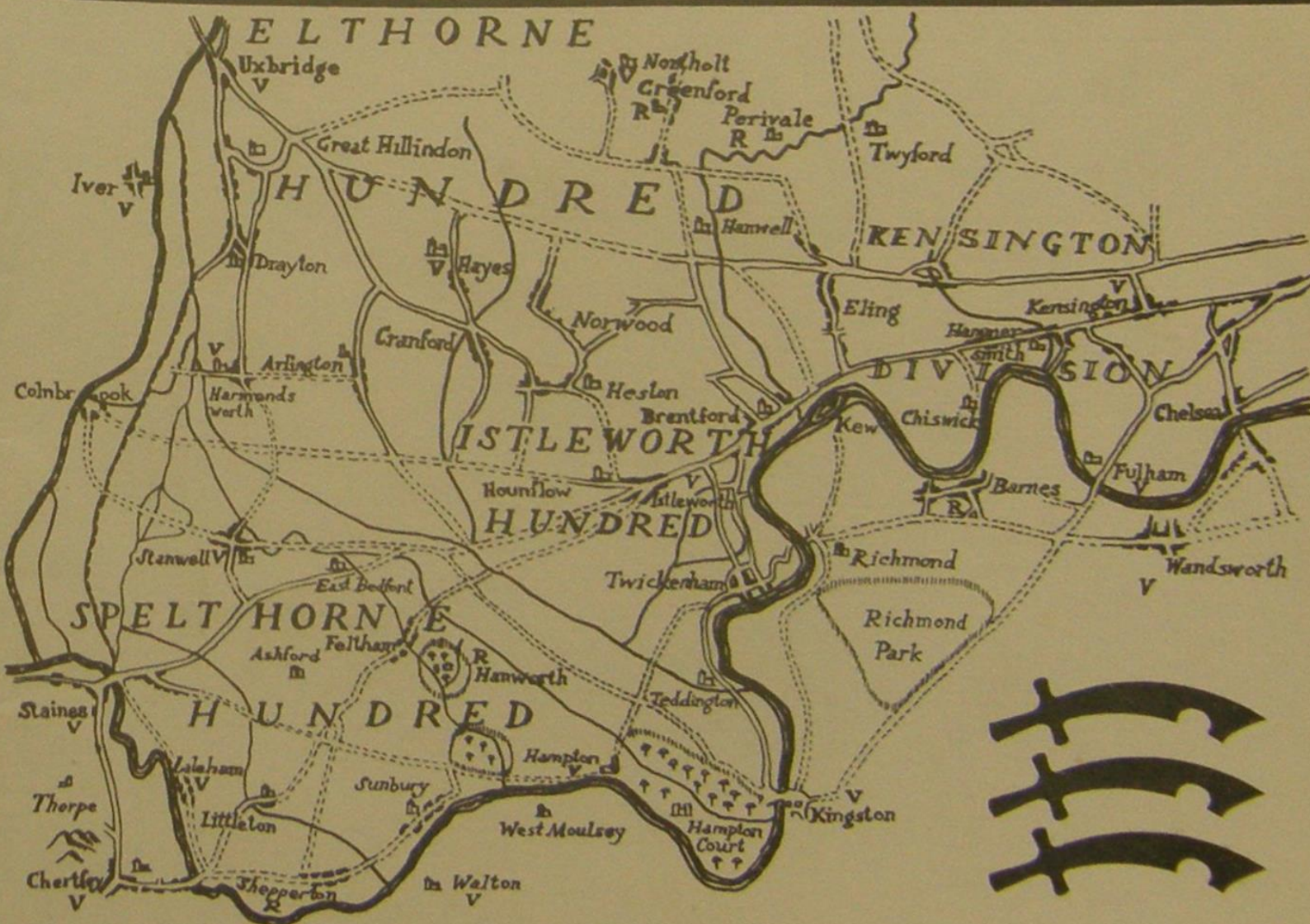

News & Events

POST 1871 CENSUS SEARCHES

The Registrar General has now restored the facility which had earlier been suspended, for making restricted searches in the censuses of 1881, 1891 and 1901. Application should be made on form PAS 1/C which is obtainable from St Catherine's House. The charge for each search is £9 (+ 72p VAT on all applications except those from abroad). The information which can be supplied is the age and place of birth recorded for named persons at a specified address. Consent for the search must be given either by the subject or by a direct descendant, together with an assurance as to the use to which the information will be put.

COURSE FOR BEGINNERS IN GENEALOGY

Chris Watts will again this year be running a course for beginners in genealogy entitled "Tracing your Ancestors." It will take place at Sunbury College on Thursday evenings, starting in late September. During the five weeks it will concentrate on starting off research into a family history and will proceed back to the Victorian period. The course may be extended, as it was last year, for a further five weeks to include research into earlier ancestors. CHARGES AT ST. CATHERINE'S HOUSE

With effect from 1 April 1979, the price of a certificate obtained at St. Catherine's House was raised from £2.50 to £2.75. The charge for postal applications was increased to £6.25 from the same date.

The Appropriation Account for the Office of Population, Censuses and Surveys for the financial year 1977-78, published earlier this year, shows that receipts from fees for searches and certified copies amounted to £730,674 (compared with £666,561 in 1976-77). This was some 20% more than had been estimated because of increased demand for certificates and increased fees. If these receipts had come entirely from £2.50 fees this would represent nearly 300,000 certificates, but one must remember that some income will have arisen from verification checks, postal applications, etc. Expenditure (other than on censuses, surveys, and certain miscellaneous services) amounted to £8,266,506 in the year, but this figure is not broken down between the cost of conducting searches and of maintaining current registration.

GENEALOGIST IN PARLIAMENT

The various potted biographies of candidates issued before the general election show that Mr. Edmund Marshall, re-elected as Labour MP for Goole on 3 May, lists genealogy as one of his interests. A number of members of the upper house are well known as genealogists. Are there any other family historians in the Commons?

We regret to record the death in November 1978 of Gillian Morris, one of the founder members of our society, at the early age of 38. She was an experienced local historian and genealogist and was Vice Chairman of Hounslow & District Local History Society.

The Local Library in tracing a Family History

Edited record of the talk by Andrea Cameron, Librarian in Charge of Local Studies, Hounslow Library on 10 November 1978

I have brought a selection of material that we have in the local history collection for the London Borough of Hounslow which would be of use to anyone tracing family history. It all relates to some part of Hounslow, but is the sort of material you might find in any local history collection. I won't say we have the largest or best collection, but I don't think we have the worst. In total we have about 20,000 items for the whole of the borough. This is split into three collections, at Chiswick Library, at Hounslow, and at Feltham for the relevant local areas.

I suppose the most obvious archives for anyone tracing family history are parish registers, and you may not think of your public library as a place to find them. But many have a representative collection, and probably will acquire more now that



the new regulations are in force for keeping parish registers. We have the parish registers of All Saints Church, Isleworth, simply because the church was gutted by fire in 1943. The records were damaged by a combination of charring and water from putting the fire out, and have been housed in Hounslow Library since then

until such time as the church can provide adequate accommodation for them. Despite the damage, they are a fairly comprehensive set of registers going back to 1566. I have brought the earliest volume along, baptisms, marriages and burials from 1566 to the 1650s, and you can see some of the problems of consulting very early documents, not only from the writing used but also from damage to the paper when mishaps have occurred.

Rate books were also under the control of the parish church until about a century ago, and are a good source for tracing residents. We have the rate books for Isleworth from 1654 until about 1865. These are not quite like modern ones. The houses did not have numbers, and often even the street is not mentioned, but they are split up into broad areas. They give the ratepayer's surname, sometimes their initials, sometimes their full first names, but not the name or the house in which

they lived. When local government areas were being formed about a century ago, rate books get more detailed. We have the Hounslow rate books from the 1870s up to 1965. They show streets with numbers and often give the name of the owner of the property as well as of the occupier. You may be able to get an idea of the type of property from the amount of rates and the rateable value. Allied to rate books, are electoral registers. The collection for this borough goes back to 1913, but some areas have earlier ones.

School records are often good way of tracing people. I have brought one of the earliest school registers we have, for Isleworth Charity School which started in 1715, and the first register goes up to 1806. Each entry gives the full name of the child, the years they attended, and their age, so you can calculate the year of birth. Then there are school log books, which each school has to keep of day-to-day happenings. They may record the names of some pupils, not all, but those who came to the attention of the headmaster, not always for a good purpose. The log I have brought along is for a truant school in Isleworth towards the end of the last century. The pupils were mostly boys who had been found as waifs and strays or who had committed some petty offence.

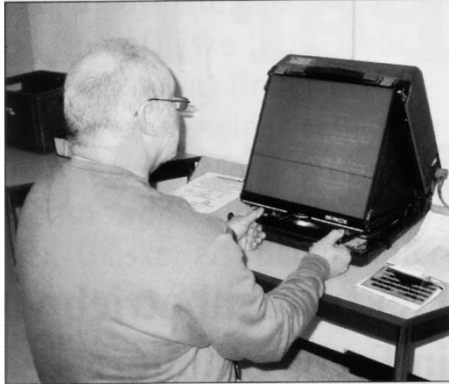
Parish magazines produced by churches usually included lists of baptisms, marriages and burials, and where they exist, they are a good source when parish registers are missing. We have a very representative collection of parish magazines, not complete, but going back over the past hundred years.

Local directories are another source for finding when someone lived in the area. Very few go back to the eighteenth century, but certainly from about 1820 most large towns had their own directory. The earliest we have for this area go back to about 1817, but are fairly limited in their information. They divide the town into two categories, the gentry and the traders. The gentry is a fairly select list that gives just the name of the householder, and perhaps the name of the house, but often just the location. For traders they give the name and the trade, and sometimes the address of the shop or business premises. By the 1880s they begin to list the streets in alphabetical order and give street numbers where these existed.

Another very good series, covering the whole county, is Kelly's Directories of Middlesex, which were issued every year. We have volumes from 1852 up to 1939. They are arranged alphabetically by town, under which are listed the private residents. Here again, they are only really listing the gentry until the end of the last century. Then comes the Commercial list showing all the traders in the town. In this century directories become more detailed and list every householder under their exact address.

One important and well used source for family history is the census return. You may not think of going to your local library to look at census returns; instead you go and queue for a reader at the PRO! We do not have a complete set for Hounslow at the moment, but I am trying, with difficulty, to get copies from the

PRO. They say they cannot see why I want them. I say I am relieving pressure on their reading room. We have a photocopy of the Chiswick volume for 1851, and some microfilms for the Heston and Isleworth area. By Christmas, I hope we will have on microfilm the census returns for the whole borough from 1841 until 1871, which as you know is the last one available for public consultation. For



Chiswick we also have the original census return for 1801, the first census to be carried out in this country, which is a very rare volume. The PRO's returns prior to 1841 were destroyed by fire, and this is a local survival. It does not give the address, but simply the name of the head of the household and the number of other people living there, whether they were employed or unemployed, male or female, children or adults.

Local newspapers are also a source for births, marriages and deaths. Our earliest paper in this area is the Middlesex Chronicle, published since 1858. We do not have a complete file, but neither does the paper itself nor the British Library Newspaper Library at Colindale. We have all loaned each other what we do have, so that we have microfilm from 1870 to date, some odd issues prior to 1870, and a bound volume from 1963. The other paper for the borough is the Brentford & Chiswick Times which started in 1895. We have a complete record of that in annual bound volumes, and also a micro-film record.

We get quite a lot of enquiries from people researching family history. Our policy is the same as I expect you have experienced elsewhere. A very general enquiry like, "I think my ancestor was born in Isleworth sometime in the eighteenth century", means you must come and consult the records yourself, otherwise we could spend all our time answering enquiries. But if it is a case of checking one entry and you can give us the date, or address or reference, we are quite happy to check it.



BROWSing through my Family History

I first became interested in Genealogy a few years ago, tracing the name Brows. I was fortunate in having a Family Bible which took me back to 1830 in detail. It was beautifully written and was reflective of a bygone era. I spent some time at Somerset House finding out a few more details, and then I wrote to Ipswich Library asking if they had any Brows names listed. They sent me two names. I asked them to recommend me to a Genealogist in the Ipswich area. I was fortunate the lady in question was extremely helpful and she offered to help me if I went to Ipswich to do some research. She managed to trace the family back to 1768 in detail. Although the Surname is extremely rare now, Suffolk was definitely the home of the Brows family a few hundred years ago. I believe the name originated from Flanders and was spelt Briouze. I have read numerous books on Genealogy and tried to find the meaning of the Surname, but without any great success.

Through my delving I have managed to trace cousins I did not know existed and it has given me great pleasure in meeting them and explaining about the Family, of whom they were not aware. After the 1830s the family lost contact with one another - my mother believed she was the last of the Brows line along with two maiden Aunts. I have now proved otherwise.

I was in Sussex a couple of years back and happened to look in a phone book for the name Brows. I visited the family and found out that a few other people by the name of Brows had also been in contact with them. This particular Brows family also came from Suffolk. I have been trying to find out how the two families are related but have not yet been successful.

It has been interesting to look at Family photos of the late 1800s and see family likenesses even though they may be only distantly related.

Whilst in Ipswich I copied Brows names down by the pageful and came back with 13 foolscap sheets which took quite a while to collate into families. I was able to look at Tithe Maps which are very much larger than Ordnance Survey Maps and are indexed as to who lived where and who owned what in the village concerned. I found them invaluable.

I also picked up books at random and came across information quite by chance. For instance, I found out that someone who married into the Brows family was in charge of the Poor House and I was able to look at bills for work that he had carried out for the Parish and the actual contract the Vicar had drawn up for the year in which Ezra Burrows took responsibility for the Poor House. I also found that William Browes penalty for stealing 33 ducks in 1766 was to be deported to America for 7 years, to work on a plantation. Whilst on the other hand one of my

second cousins is now a well-known Art Historian working on Wells Cathedral and the Round Table at Winchester, and has appeared on television.

One of the most interesting finds are the wills - if you can read them. From here I was able to construct families that I had not previously found, and to find out what their position was in life.

I also visited the villages they lived in and the graveyards looking for Browns tombstones. In Sudbourne churchyard I found Robert Browes buried next to his third wife. I was amazed to find the graves in such good condition. It struck me that I was the first person to visit their graves in about 150 years.

I spent a good four hours at a Vicarage on the borders of Norfolk looking through Parish Registers. Again; I was lucky. I found a list of Tithe Rents and here are a few examples:

Whilst on another page the Vicar had duly noted that “Mr. Nash died without thinking to give me the guinea he had promised.”

I have found Genealogy to be a natural extension of History and I have thoroughly enjoyed my visits back into the past. My one regret is that I cannot and never will meet all my ancestors, whom I have found out so much about. To me they have become more than just names, “They are Family”

Out of Area "Strays" Index

As indicated elsewhere, an index of Middlesex (and indeed London) strays has been set up from parish registers etc., extracts being supplied by members and others. 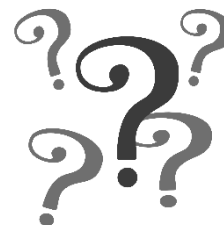

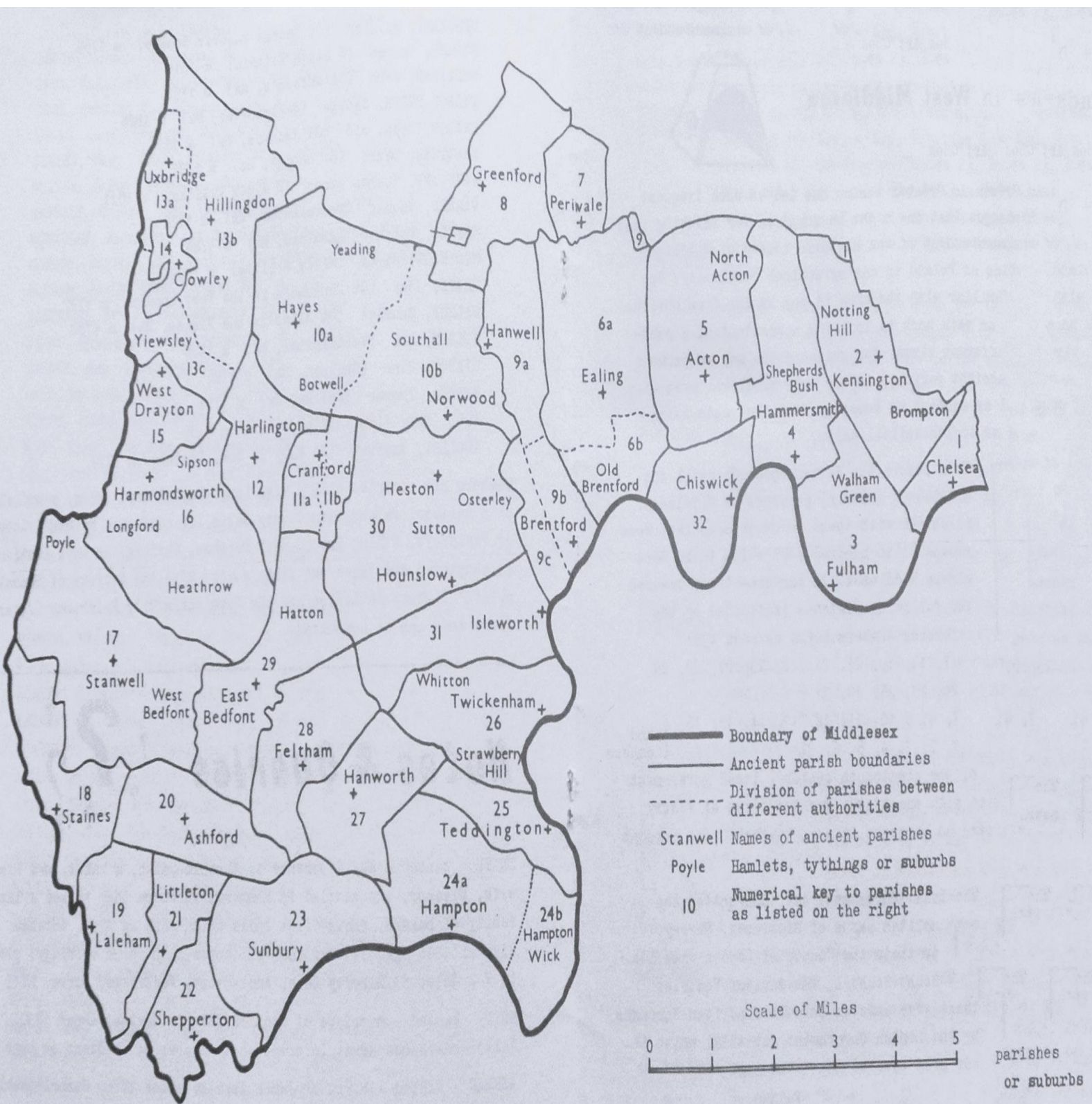

Aids to Research

Boundaries in West Middlesex - by Robert Cook

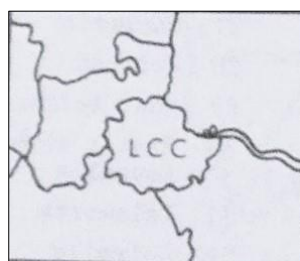
Population growth in Greater London has led to such frequent administrative changes that one might be forgiven for thinking that the successive dismemberment of the historic county of Middlesex rivals the partition of Poland in cartographical complexity. For the researcher unfamiliar with the area, it may be far from obvious in which directory or rate book to look for a resident of a particular parish at different times. For guidance the map on pages 42 - 43 shows the ancient parishes in the West Middlesex area – not necessarily all as ancient as Domesday Book, but ones which were civil as well as ecclesiastical units.



From before the Norman conquest until the nineteenth century, parishes in Middlesex, in common with those in other counties, were grouped into hundreds, of which there were six in Middlesex. In our area these covered the following parishes (indicated by the reference numbers keyed on page 43):

Until the last quarter of the nineteenth century, local government in these parishes rested with one of the various forms of Vestry meeting, since there were no boroughs in our area until the present century.



The Local Government Act 1888 united the metropolitan parts of Middlesex, Surrey, and Kent into the County of London with its own County Council. The various Vestries there were erected into Metropolitan Boroughs by the London Government Act 1899, which in our area covered the following:

The remaining parts of the historic counties were constituted under County Councils. Under the Local Government Act 1894 the more populous parishes were made into one or more urban districts, while the remaining parishes were grouped into rural districts.

The London Government Act 1964 created the Greater London Council to absorb the old London County Council area and the surrounding belt of Essex, Middlesex, Herts, Surrey and Kent. In Middlesex this meant the entire county, except for small districts which were transferred to other administrative counties.

Research Report

by V. E. Gale



It is pleasing to be able to report that my note in the first issue of the journal and my remarks at our meeting, have met with a response which indicates a willingness on the part of members to commit some of their valuable time to work for the general good of genealogy, rather than only to their own family histories.

Certainly, my request for notes of “out of area” entries (strays) did not fall on deaf ears and I already have the beginnings of what should prove to be a useful collection. The first section, in abbreviated form, is published on pages 38-41 of this journal.

The past few months have not been suitable to get out to do any fieldwork in the matter of Memorial Inscriptions. In any event my plans for surveying needs (what has been done and what is outstanding) have slipped back and I am still building up a file of the location and condition of the graveyards, cemeteries and burial grounds in our area. I have already asked at our meetings for members to look around their home areas and let me have their notes - if you have not done yours yet, do please get down to it so that we can have an accurate idea of the task that is before us.

I had thought originally that it would be necessary for us to institute a programme of work on Marriage Indexing. However, as is indicated elsewhere in this journal there is already a very substantial coverage of this search source in existence. It is important of course, that we play our part in continuing this vital work and I am very glad to be able to record that some of our members are already doing so. By arrangement with Mr. Cliff Webb of the West Surrey Society, who is organising the current indexing work for Middlesex, a number of copies of parish registers were made available to us and my call for volunteers met with an enthusiastic response from a number of our members. By the time this note is printed, their work will have been incorporated in the main index.

Middlesex Marriage Indexes by V. E. Gale

There are a number of indexes to marriages available or in progress for the county of Middlesex and it has been suggested that a note on the subject might be of some value to members.

(a) The Pallot Index

This is a commercially operated index, run by Achievements Ltd., the professional team which supports the Institute of Heraldic and Genealogical Studies (Northgate, Canterbury, Kent) and claims a success rate in its searches of nearly seventy per cent.

It deals mainly with the period 1780 to 1837 and is very extensive for the City of London (including marriages in 101 of the 103 ancient parishes) and it also contains millions of references to marriages in Greater London and the Home Counties, which of course, includes Middlesex. It includes entries unknown to Boyd from registers no longer in existence and it is still being augmented.

The minimum search fee is at present £5.00

(b) Boyd's Index

This is a typescript index of marriages from Parish Registers and Bishop's Transcripts, originally compiled by the late Mr. Percival Boyd, with some later volumes added by the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-Day Saints. The complete index is kept at the Society of Genealogists but copies of individual volumes can be seen in county libraries elsewhere.

For Middlesex and London, the index covers 160 parishes, and there is a copy of this section at the Guildhall Library, London.

(c) The Middlesex Marriage Indexes in the West Surrey FHS collections

These are the work of Mr. Cliff Webb, Research Coordinator of that Society, commenced when he was a resident of Middlesex.

There are two indexes: (1) covering the period from 1813 to 1837 which was not extensively dealt with by Boyd, and (2) covering the relatively few parishes for the period before 1813 which are not covered at all in Boyd.

(1) 1813-1837 At the time of writing, this index covers the following parishes though not all are necessarily yet complete and the work continues:

Acton, Ashford, East Bedfont, Brentford, Cowley, Cranford, Drayton, Edgware, Feltham, Harmondsworth, Harrow, Hayes, Heston, Hillington, Hounslow, Hoxton, Ickenham, Isleworth, Islington, Kingsbury, Laleham, Littleton, Northolt, Norwood, Ruislip, St. Katherine

by the Tower, Shepperton, Staines, Little Stanmore, Stanwell, Stoke Newington, Sunbury, Twickenham, and West Twyford.

(2) Pre - 1813 Boyd had covered the part of Middlesex outside the old LCC area very extensively and only about twenty parishes in that part are not included in his index for the period up to 1812. Work is in hand to complete these outstanding parishes and some have indeed been done:

Friern Barnet, Cranford, Edgware, Harmondsworth, Hornsey, Laleham, Littleton, Norwood and Shepperton – and these are in the Surrey Society's indexes. Still to be done are Ashford (part) East Bedfont, Harrow, Highgate, Isleworth, Kingsbury, Perivale, Ruislip, Staines, Little Stanmore and Twyford.

Work is currently in hand (some of it by members of the West Middlesex Society) to complete this index and so, with Boyd, cover the whole County.

Full lists of the parishes covered in the indexes in the Surrey collections (with details of the periods covered etc.) are available from Mr. Webb (3 Hawthorn Close, Woking, Surrey) price 10p plus a stamped addressed envelope. Searches can be carried out at a cost of 50p (plus SAE) FOR SPECIFIC NAMES. General searches will be carried out after a quotation has been provided (costs approximate to 10p per entry). A stamped addressed envelope is required with all enquiries.
